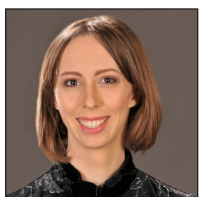

## 2012 Conference Speakers



Keynote speaker **Raymond Cardinal Leo Burke** is the Cardinal Prefect of the Supreme Tribunal of the Apostolic Signatura, having previously served as Archbishop of St. Louis and Bishop of La Crosse. Cardinal Burke was born in Richland Center, Wisconsin, the youngest of the six children of Thomas and Marie Burke, on June 30, 1948. Pope Paul VI ordained Burke to the priesthood on June 29, 1975, at Saint Peter's Basilica. He holds a Master of Arts in Theology, a Licentiate in Canon Law, a Diploma in Latin Letters and Doctorate in Canon Law, all from Rome's Pontifical Gregorian University.

During his tenure in Saint Louis, Archbishop Burke was awarded two honorary doctorates in humane letters, one from Ave Maria University and the other from Christendom College.



**Dr. Jennifer Donelson** is assistant professor of music at Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. She received her DMA in Piano Performance from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and is a founder of the annual Musica Sacra Florida Gregorian chant conference. Her daily work in Gregorian chant spans three dioceses in southern Florida, where she directs scholae cantorum for liturgies in both the Ordinary and Extraordinary forms of the Mass, and teaches

chant in the children's choirs at the Oratory of Ave Maria, Florida.



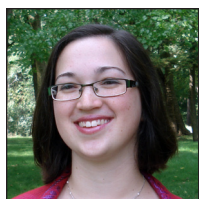
**Dr. David Fagerberg** is an associate professor in the Theology Department of the University of Notre Dame. He holds an M.Div. from Luther Northwestern Seminary, an M.A. from St. John's University, Collegeville, and S.T.M. from Yale Divinity School and an M.A., M.Phil. and Ph.D. from Yale University. He is the author of *Theologica Prima: What Is Liturgical Theology?* and *The Size of Chesterton's Catholicism*. He is currently working on a new book on liturgical asceticism.



**Dr. Robert Fastiggi** is Professor of Systematic Theology at Sacred Heart Major Seminary in Detroit, Michigan. He holds a B.A. in Religion from Dartmouth College, and a M.A. and Ph.D. in Theology from Fordham University. Some of his publications include *The Natural Theology of Yves de Paris*, *The Mystical Theology of the Catholic Reformation: An Overview of Baroque Spirituality* and *What the Church Teaches about Sex: God's Plan for Human Happiness*.



**Dr. Michael Foley** holds a doctorate in Catholic systematic theology from Boston College and is associate professor of Patristics in the Great Texts Program at Baylor University. He is the editor of Frank Sheed's translation of St. Augustine's *Confessions* and the author of *Why Do Catholics Eat Fish on Friday?* *The Catholic Origin of Just About Everything* and *Wedding Rites: A Complete Guide to Traditional Vows, Music, Ceremonies, Blessings, and Interfaith Services*.



**Ms. Claire Gilligan** holds a B.A. in Catechetics from the Franciscan University of Steubenville and an M.A. in Liturgical Studies from the Liturgical Institute of the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary. She currently serves as Associate Director of the Office for Divine Worship in the Archdiocese of Atlanta.



**Dr. Keith Lemna** has taught at The Catholic University of America, Belmont Abbey College, and is currently Visiting Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology at Saint Meinrad Seminary. He has published in several journals, including (among others) *Antiphon*, *The Heythrop Journal*, *Nova et Vetera*, and *Communio*. Currently, he is researching the connection between the advent of twentieth century liturgical theology and renewed interest in Trinitarian theology.



**Dr. Anthony Lilles** is an assistant professor at St. John Vianney Theological Seminary in Denver, Colorado. He teaches spiritual theology having specialized in this at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas (Angelicum). The former academic dean and former director of the Office of Liturgy for the Archdiocese of Denver, he currently serves as Secretary for the Board of the Society of Catholic Liturgy.



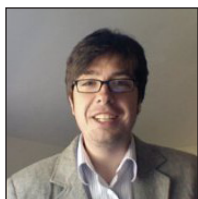
**Sr. Madeleine Grace, CVI**, is a member of the Congregation of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament and earned her doctorate in Historical Theology at St. Louis University. She presently holds the Scanlan Chair in Theology at the University of St. Thomas in Houston where she serves as an Associate Professor. Her specific area of specialization is Church History (early Church) coupled with a keen interest in Spirituality.



**Sr. Esther Mary Nickel, RSM**, a member of the Religious Sisters of Mercy of Alma, Michigan, completed a Doctorate in Sacred Liturgy at Rome's Pontifical Institute for the Liturgy Sant'Anselmo. Her doctoral work investigated the development of the liturgical texts comprising the Formularies for the Mass and Liturgy of the Hours celebrating the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Mercy, the Titular Solemnity in the Proper Calendar for the Religious Sisters of Mercy of Alma. She is currently Professor of Sacred Liturgy and Sacramental Theology at Saint John Vianney Theological Seminary in Denver, Colorado.



**Richard Norton** has taught Theology in Universities, Colleges and Schools in the UK and Africa. He is a Member of the British Association for the Study of Spirituality and Chairman of MONOS – the Centre for the Study of Monastic Culture and Spirituality. Richard holds an MA in Political Theology from the University of Bristol and a BA in Systematic Theology and Church History from the University of Exeter together with qualifications in Law.



**Timothy O'Malley, PhD** is the acting director of the Notre Dame Center for Liturgy. He received his M.T.S. from the University of Notre Dame in liturgical studies and his doctorate from Boston College in theology and education. His research interests include sacramental theology, preaching and liturgical spirituality.



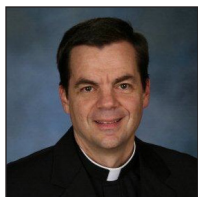
**Br. Innocent Smith** is a Dominican friar of the Province of St. Joseph (New York). He is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame, where he studied music and philosophy, and is currently enrolled in theological studies at the Pontifical Faculty of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC.



**Dr. Daria Spezzano** is a post-doctoral Teaching Scholar at Notre Dame, where she recently completed her doctoral dissertation entitled *The Grace of the Holy Spirit, the Virtue of Charity, and the Gift of Wisdom: Deification in the Thought of Thomas Aquinas*. Her academic specialization is patristic and medieval theology, focusing on grace, sacraments and spirituality. She holds a Master's Degree in Liturgical Studies from the Liturgical Institute at the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary.



**Steven Surrency** is intensely interested in the interplay between liturgical, ethical and sociological behavior. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in interdisciplinary social science and a MA in linguistics. He is soon to complete his PhD in philosophy and religion, with a dissertation entitled *Dogma, Relativism, and Ambiguity: A Gadamerian Solution?* Since his conversion to Catholicism 7 years ago, he has been active in his parish as the master of ceremonies and as the director of faith formation.



**Fr. John Ubel** was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis in 1989. He served as a high school religion teacher and seminary instructor prior to becoming pastor of the Church of Saint Agnes in St. Paul in 2006. Saint Agnes sponsors a K-12 school and has a proud history of promoting sacred music and Latin in the Liturgy.



**Dr. Daniel Van Slyke** holds a M.A. in theology from the University of Dallas, an S.T.L. from the University of St. Mary of the Lake, and a Ph.D. in historical theology from St. Louis University. He has published articles in various venues, including *Antiphon*, *Dumbarton Oaks Papers*, *Ephemerides Liturgicae*, *The Homiletic and Pastoral Review*, *The Josephinum Journal of Theology*, *The New Catholic Encyclopedia*, and *The New Westminster Dictionary of Church History*. Currently on the board of advisors for the journals

*Ephemerides Liturgicae* and *Usus Antiquior*.
